Dr. Cancel-Tirado is the Associate Dean of Students Services and Well-being for the College of Health and Professor of Public Health at Oregon State University Division. She has held other notable leadership roles, including being appointed by Oregon's Governor to the Oregon Commission for Women and serving as the Co-Chair for the Western Oregon University (WOU) Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI) Advisory Board.
