Daniel López-Cevallos, PhD, MPH, is Associate Professor of Health Equity in the Department of Health Promotion and Policy at the University of Massachusetts Amherst School of Public Health and Health Sciences. His research and evaluation work addresses the intersections of race/ethnicity, gender, class, migration, and other socioeconomic and sociocultural constructs, and their relationship to health and educational issues.

Further, he is invested in the development and implementation of community, institutional, and policy-level strategies to better serve Latinx and other marginalized communities in Latin America and the United States.

To date his work has focused on five broadly defined themes: (1) experiences of health care discrimination and medical mistrust, (2) everyday discrimination and educational attainment among immigrant students and their families, (3) cardiovascular disease and use of health care services among immigrant farmworkers, (4) institutional and policy challenges to addressing health inequities, and (5) strengthening civic engagement for health.

He has published widely on these topics, including 47 articles in high-impact, peerreviewed journals (e.g., The American Journal of Public Health, Journal of Immigrant and Minority Health, Health Policy and Planning, The Lancet Global Health, Health Equity), five book chapters, two educational tools, and 33 other publications and technical reports. He is also a frequent speaker at regional, national, and international conferences and meetings, delivering 68 invited and 79 peer-reviewed presentations to date.

Prior to UMass-Amherst, he was Assistant Professor of Community Health at Western Oregon University (2008-2012), and Associate Professor (tenured) of Ethnic Studies and Health Equity at Oregon State University (2012-2022). At OSU, he also held leadership roles as Associate Director of Research for the Center for Latina/o Studies and Engagement (2012-2017), and Assistant Vice Provost for Undergraduate Education (2019-2022).

Dr. López-Cevallos obtained his PhD in Public Health from Oregon State University, and his BS and MPH degrees from Universidad San Francisco de Quito, Ecuador.
